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Homework Policy

Intent

At Longfield Academy, we passionately believe that homework plays an important role in helping our students to make outstanding progress and is a core element for our students to 'achieve beyond expectations'. Teaching and learning and the delivery of our curriculum is not restricted to within the classroom or during lesson time. Our students are given every opportunity to improve knowledge, develop skills and master each subject through a fluid homework system. Homework also gives our students opportunities to develop their independence, resilience and organisation skills required for their studies and further education.

When setting homework, teachers will ensure the following key elements:

- Aims of the homework are clear
- Quality is prioritised over quantity
- Tasks are well-designed and linked to classroom learning
- High-quality feedback is provided to ensure progress

Research

This homework policy has been developed alongside research from the <u>Education Endowment Foundation</u> (EEF) which highlighted the importance of the four key elements above. Another key finding was that effective feedback can increase a student's progress by five months or more. This emphasises how important homework is to every student at our academy.

Aims

Homework enables students to:

- Consolidate and extend work covered in class or prepare for new learning activities
- Access resources not available in the classroom
- Develop research skills
- Have an opportunity for independent work
- Show progress and understanding
- To enhance their study skills, for example planning, time management and self discipline
- To take ownership and responsibility for learning
- Engage parental cooperation and support
- Create channels for homeschool dialogue
- To further challenge and extend our most able students
- To provide focused and sustained support for less able students

Responsibilities

Student:

- To listen to homework instructions in class
- To frequently check for any homework that has been set on Google Classroom
- To complete all homework to the best of their ability and meet the deadline
- To contact the teacher setting the homework if there are any questions or concerns relating to the homework this must be done in advance of the homework deadline

Teacher:

- To set all Google Classroom homework by 15:00 on the Monday of each week
- To set high-quality homework that supports the educational research referred to in this policy
- To provide a range of high-quality feedback on homework
- To record all completed and incomplete homework on Bromcom
- To make contact with home should there be ongoing concerns with incomplete homework

Directors of Learning/Subject Leaders:

- To support teachers in their department with setting high-quality homework
- To monitor the setting of homework to ensure the quantity expectations in this policy are met
- To provide examples of homework as best practice across the academy

Setting Homework

All homework is set on Google Classrooms. Every subject will have its own Google Classroom with the students as members. Within this digital classroom, students will see a topic called "Homework" with all their homework tasks listed below. Further details, such as what the task involves, the deadline and more, will be detailed here. If a student has any questions or concerns they are advised to contact the teacher setting the homework prior to the deadline. This can be done via the Google Classroom messaging facility.

The homework set will be a healthy mix of different tasks. Some will be handwritten tasks to ensure our students maintain and develop their handwriting skills in preparation for public examinations and situations where handwriting is needed. In addition, subjects have a wide range of online resources, such as Tassomai, which allow students to complete homework online. These tasks are especially effective for students to develop their retrieval practice over a longer period of time, further strengthening their ability to recall key information and knowledge.

Knowledge Organisers

At the start of every module, knowledge organisers are shared with students in their Google Classrooms. A knowledge organiser contains a range of information that students need to be able to recall in order to master a unit or topic. Some will also contain homework tasks that teachers may direct students to when setting homework.

Quantity

Whilst quality is more important than quantity, it is still integral for our students to be given enough homework that will ensure they are effectively challenged to secure academic progress. The academy follows the EEF research which recommends around five to ten hours of homework should be completed every week.

Students will be issued with the following quantity of homework every week:

- Years 7, 8 and 9
 - o **Two** 30-45 minute pieces of homework should be set by:
 - Language and Literature
 - Mathematics
 - Science
 - One 30-45 minutes piece of homework for each of the other MYP subjects (except Physical and Health Education)

Years 10 and 11

- o **Two** 45-60 minute pieces of homework should be set by:
 - English Language and Literature (at least one should be handwritten)
 - Mathematics
 - Double Science (Separate Sciences one piece per science)
- One 45-60 minutes piece of homework for each of the other GCSE subjects

Subjects that are setting one piece of homework and have very few lessons per week may find it better to set project homework. This could last a whole module/unit where students add work to their project each week. Similarly, subjects with more lessons, such as English, may set one large piece of year 11 homework that would take an hour and a half rather than two 45 minute pieces.

Rewards and sanctions

It is important that the academy monitors the completion of homework and acknowledges when students do well. All completed homework is recorded and logged on our behaviour system as a positive point for that student. Outstanding pieces of homework will also be recorded and rewarded with an additional point. This positive point is labelled 'Excellent Homework' - to ensure that students and parents are kept up-to-date. At the end of every module, Directors of Learning and Subject Leaders will discuss with their departments any examples of excellent homework. They will award 1 student each with an amazon voucher, in recognition of their efforts.

In cases where homework is not completed, a negative point will be issued by the teacher. Students will be issued with an after school detention every third time they fail to complete homework. The time spent in a detention should be used to complete the homework that remains incomplete. In cases where a student consistently fails to complete homework, the teacher will contact the parent/carer to discuss any issues that may be causing this.

Reporting

In addition to teachers recording points on our behaviour system for homework, parents/carers will also be given feedback on their child's attitude to learning:

- **Excellent**: A student who applies themselves consistently to homework tasks regardless of outcome. The student frequently exceeds expectations and demonstrates their own initiative.
- **Good**: A student who applies themselves well in the majority of their homework tasks and completes them to the best of their ability.
- **Requires improvement**: A student who could work well and complete homework tasks to the expected standard, but greater consistency in effort and organisation is required.
- Concern: A student who does not show sufficient commitment in this subject which has an impact on their own learning. They may show little resilience by giving up easily and lack the discipline to complete all homework. A serious improvement in effort is required.

Monitoring

Throughout each module, the quality and quantity of homework will be monitored by Directors of Learning/Subject Leaders who will share excellent homework examples and provide teachers with additional support where necessary. In modules one, three and five, a homework review will be conducted for all subjects with Directors/Subject Leaders alongside the Senior Leadership Team. Best practice will be shared across the academy and where there are areas for development, Directors/Subject Leaders would be expected to address these before the next review.

Disadvantaged students

Every student at Longfield Academy has been issued with their own chromebook which will prevent there being any issues with accessing and completing homework set. In addition, the academy runs a "Success Lounge" (homework club) every Wednesday 14:00-16:00 to ensure students are given further opportunities to complete the work set. These sessions will have staff who will be able to assist students. This is closely monitored by staff who record when and which students attend as well as which homework they have completed.

Suggested timetables

Published on the Longfield Academy website, are some suggested timetables for completing homework. These are not compulsory as we recognise that students and families have other commitments during evenings and weekends. However, they are published as a supportive guide if students wish to use them.
